The Binational Colorectal Cancer Audit (BCCA) is a Clinical Quality Registry and clinical audit of colorectal cancer surgery that has been run across New Zealand and Australia since 2007. The audit has over 150 sites registered binationally and there are currently over 26,000 treatment episodes recorded in the registry. BCCA allows individual surgeons and units to obtain instant data summaries of all submitted cases at any time and the opportunity to access the entire dataset's deidentified data for research. It also facilitates real time benchmarking, enabling surgeons to get continuous feedback on their outcomes compared to all other submitting hospitals.

BCCA is a declared Quality Assurance Activity by both the Australian and New Zealand Health Departments.

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


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SITE PLAN
